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

January – Andrew Wells

Jackson Hole Airport Parking Lot Improvements -More Parking for Everyone

Have you ever arrived at work and had to circle the employee lot to find an available parking space? Those days will soon be a distant memory.

During the past week construction has begun on reconfiguration of the public parking lot. This change is taking place for two primary reasons:

- An additional 150 parking spaces will be created for the public
- A new parking lot access system will be installed to greatly ease the process of purchasing parking, and travelers will no longer need to prepay for overnight parking.

How Parking Will Work

The new system will include an automated entrance gate at the each of 3 parking lots. (A long term lot, short term lot, and employee/overflow lot.). Each car entering the lots will receive a ticket at the entrance gate noting the date and time of its arrival. When it is time to leave, the driver just scans their ticket at the exit gate and a visual display will tell them how much they owe. After inserting a credit card to pay for parking, the arm on the gate will rise and they are free to depart. (For day access without charge, employees will use their airport badge to easily go through the entrance and exit gates of the employee/overflow lot.)


Reconfiguration of Airport Parking

In order to make room for 150 more parking spaces, the following modifications will be made to the current layout of the parking lot:

- Employee parking will move from the area in front of the Admin and Firehouse buildings to the south parking lot (where construction is currently taking place). There will also be additional employee parking available airside, next to the Firehouse
- Short term parking will be moved from rows 9 and 10 to the parking lot in front of the Admin/Firehouse buildings (where employees park today)
- At the northeast end of the main parking lot there will be a designated Cell Parking Area that will be available for those waiting to pick up passengers
- To meet increased demand, Uber/Lyft (TNC) parking will be expanded to include the entire space between Hangar 1 and the southern hangars
- Rental car parking will not change, and will remain in rows 1-8

The goal is to have the key elements completed by July 1st, so we are ready for the increased parking demand during peak summer months.

Flight Path to Zero Waste



To further our commitment to our environment, the Jackson Hole Airport Board has hired consultants Mead & Hunt to help us become a zero waste facility. The first goal will be to redirect 60% of unnecessary material by 2030 through focusing on the following areas: expanding recycling to include additional types of items, increasing the donation and composting of food waste, and diverting new liquid substances to sources that can properly repurpose them.

More Passengers, Less Airplane Noise

Jackson Hole Airport is always focused on keeping aircraft noise at minimal levels for the surrounding community. Since 2001, enplaned passenger counts have increased 113% while the amount of noise from flights has decreased by 41% from 2001 levels. This can be attributed to several factors including larger planes that accommodate more passengers per flight and newer technology making the planes quieter during operation.
