




Welcome New Staff Members

GTNP Report



Park staff shares the community's concerns about the impact to visitors and wildlife as it pertains to noise from helicopters. The Park has done a lot of work and research, some with tour operators, over the last couple years. Because of this, the Park has learned a great deal about their authority over such operations. Park staff would like to see helicopter operations take place closer to the highway and away from noise sensitive areas but is limited in their authority if the flights are not scenic Park tours.

The Park announced public scoping for considerations on what they can do to protect native big horn sheep. This effort includes removing non-native mountain goats and working with winter recreationists on balancing opportunities in the Park with protecting winter habitats. Bears began making the news again, and the Park asks that everyone do their part to secure attractants.

Moose Wilson Road will be under construction during the week but will be open over the weekends from 7 pm on Fridays to 7 am on Mondays. It will close again after Labor Day weekend. The Granite Canyon Trailhead will be closed all summer for upgrades.

The Park worked closely with the Town of Jackson, the Chamber of Commerce, and the County after the Yellowstone flooding took place to ensure the area could accommodate displaced travelers and the potential swell of guests changing plans. There was a little uptick in the campground usage, but it was not overwhelming. The Park was closely monitoring what visitation numbers looked like as it neared the busier visitor timeframe.



Paul Walters Retires After 33 Years





Capital Projects Update



The morning of June 28th was a momentous day for the Airport as we celebrated the reopening with a ribbon cutting event. This marked the completion of the TSA Checkpoint, the Runway Phase 2 Reconstruction, and updates to the Holdroom area.

As we move into August, Phase 3 of the runway reconstruction kicks off and includes runway grooving and striping. This should be completed by mid-September of this year.

The restaurant and gate projects are still underway.
This includes renovating the restaurant area to improve the customer experience and overall comfort. This includes some additional boarding gates to raise operational efficiency.



These are expected to be completed by the end of the year.



2021-22 Balchen/Post Award Winner

Safety Inspection Results

The Airport went through a safety audit with the Wyoming Deptartment of Workforce Services this past March. This is a process the organization has gone through before. While the inspector found some minor items for correction, most were resolved on the spot with the inspector present, or within a few weeks of the inspection. The feedback from the inspector was extremely positive in general, particularly on the Operations Team's documentation, safety meetings, and processes.


